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# 1. INTRODUCTION

In July 2022, Council sought the community's feedback on a proposal to name three Unnamed Laneways in North Parramatta.

Council sought the advice of a Dharug language consultant and Council's Heritage team. The options were checked to ensure they met NSW Geographical Names Board requirements and presented to the community.

# 2. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Council sought the community's feedback from Monday 18 July to Monday 8 August 2022.

The objectives of the consultation were:


Engagement Level	Objectives
Inform	Communicate that Council had worked with Council's Heritage team and with the Geographic Names Board (GNB) to investigate site appropriate names that reflect the local area.
Consult	Obtain input from a Dharug language consultant and feedback from the wider community on ten options for naming the three laneways.

#### 2.1. SUMMARY OF KEY FINDINGS

Council received 106 submissions over the consultation period:

- 103 via Participate Parramatta
- 2 via email
- 1 via mail

Overall, the community demonstrated a high level of engagement with the project. The most popular options were Birrung Lane, Warrawal Lane, Mula Mula Lane and Duba Lane; followed by Stamp Lane, Pound Lane and Butchers Lane.

# 3. ENGAGEMENT EVALUATION

This section reports on the communication and engagement channels used to promote the naming project to people who live in North Parramatta and surrounding suburbs.

Several methods and channels were used to reach the community and direct them to Council's online engagement portal Participate Parramatta to provide feedback. Overall, the opportunity to provide feedback for this project was presented on 94,888 occasions culminating in 106 formal contributions.

#### Resources

A poster was designed to support promote the project. The poster also included a QR code which was scanned 76 times.

#### Direct mail out

610 letters detailing the exhibition were sent locally.

#### Social Media

The exhibition was promoted via a paid campaign on Facebook. Overall, the social media campaign garnered a reach of 83,392 resulting in 3,771 clicks to the project page.

- Overall, the campaign had high engagement indicating the content resonated with the audience.
- 29% of results came from 25-34 yo, 21% came from 35-44 yo and 13% from 65+ yo.







#### Q. Would you like to share a comment about your preferred names?

This was answered by 41 participants. The following was noted:

The community appreciated the opportunity to choose between indigenous and non-indigenous names for the laneways:

- We need more balance and inclusion of all the cultural groups that live here together, most particularly the traditional owners.
- One laneway should be named for a past activity, one for an aboriginal name and one for history.
- It's a wonderful idea to use Dharug names, showing our respect for the people who have lived here and cared for this land for so long. It reflects the growing desire to connect with Aboriginal culture in the community.
- There are already plenty of European names in Parramatta. We need more balance and inclusion of all the cultural groups that live here together, most particularly the traditional owners.
- Parramatta definitely needs to embrace and visibly recognise the pre-colonisation history more. What a wonderful opportunity to have the Barramattagal land recognised this way.

#### Other interesting comments include:

- Please don't call anything Butcher's lane, it sounds like somewhere you'll be murdered. And Fleshewer sounds like a horrible skin disease.
- On the land sign, is, or could there be, the translation (in smaller print)? (Not much point in recognising the Aboriginal name, if nobody knows it has been done).
- References to individual people or families are outdated concepts. Names using Dharug language can contribute to greater connection to Aboriginal culture and acknowledge the histories and existence of Aboriginal culture in Australia.

#### 4.2. Email and verbal submissions

Two (2) emails were received by the Place Services team during the consultation period along with one (1) letter. One email suggested the indigenous name of Baludarri Lane; the second supported the options, and the third wrote their preference on the letter received from Council.

#### Email 1. Received 21/07/2022

Hi.

I propose that one of the lanes be called Baludarri Lane. Baludarri was an Aboriginal man who had a relationship with Arthur Philip. I am a school teacher and the students were so interested to learn about this story about Parramatta's history.

NB: The name Baludarri Drive already exists in Parramatta along with Baludarri Wetland. As such, this is considered a duplication and will not be accepted by the Geographical Names Board. Submission has been acknowledged.

#### Email 2. Received 03/08/2022

Thank you for the opportunity to participate in the naming of the 'Laneways in North Parramatta'.

My suggestions with comments are below.

1. Lane connecting Belmore St to Bellevue St.

Suggestion is "Pound Lane" as it runs parallel to Pennant Hills Road and could have been connected with the Parramatta Pound.

2. Lane connecting Belmore St with Gladstone St.

Suggestion is, "Cunneen "Lane as the Cunneen family must have had a major contact with the area when their homes are all listed on Gladstone St with a possibility of their properties having access to Belmore Street from the rear of their properties

3. Lane running parallel to Gladstone St, with a dead end at the eastern end of the lane. Note that at the eastern end of the lane there is a stormwater drain which starts up near Pennant Hills Road and this drain appears to follow the path parallel to Brickfield St, named, originally Brickfield Creek, and ends at Parramatta River.

I suggest the name could be '<u>Duba Lane'</u> as the Iane could have been used for the manufacturing of the handmade bricks attributed to John Clews, he would have used local clay and water from the area.

A summary of findings should also be reported back to the community (when appropriate but in a timely manner), highlighting how community feedback has influenced the project. The final decision and reasons why should be made public and reported back to those who provided feedback.

These recommendations are in line with Council's engagement principles and commitments outlined in the Community Engagement Strategy and Community and Stakeholder Engagement Policy.

There are already plenty of European names in Parramatta. We need more balance and inclusion of all the cultural groups that live here together, most particularly the traditional owners. So much of them has already been erased; while naming a few lanes won't return what has already been taken from them, surely traditional owners should be deciding how the remainder is named. To me it seems like if Aboriginal names aren't used, they will be even more erased from our maps and from the identity of this place.

This is nothing political, but street names should only be named after people or families if there is absolutely no doubt as to that family or persons benevolence and compassion - this is only true of a handful of people in the entire world, so it is best to steer clear of people/family names. Also, motivated individuals may find cause to investigate the family and it is almost a certainty that, in Australia, predominantly white families will have some egregious history which should not be immortalised in a street name (also, saves from the hassle of having to change street names each time).

When considering name changes, Aboriginal culture, heritage and history should be given primacy for anything related to land, sky and waterways - this is True Australia. We should take a page out of New Zealand's book when it comes to this stuff.

It would be good to consider Burramattagal as a name.

I feel that at least one of the lanes should have an indigenous name, to recognise the traditional custodians of the lands.

I associate a reference to 'butcher' with slaughter and Jack The Ripper - sorry to all the awesome butchers out there who help feed us, but for me, the word carries negative vibes. I wouldn't want to walk down "Butcher Lane".

I think it should be Aboriginal names chosen, we are after all living on First Nations land

References to individual people or families are outdated concepts. Names using Dharug language can contribute to greater connection to Aboriginal culture and acknowledge the histories and existence of Aboriginal culture in Australia.

I have ranked the names based on what historical things were undertaken in the area.

Go with a Star theme and put in some pavement decorations etc to make it a point of interest

l like some of the names with historical significance but there are so few Dharug words used for streets in Parramatta, so this is a way to address that. And they are beautiful words.

like the sound & meaning if these names - both Dharug & English.

Hi, my preferred names are

Warrawal Lane

Mula Mula Lane

Cunneen Lane

You should name one for a past activity one for an aboriginal name and one for history

It should be named after an early resident.

They sound great!

l love the ideas from Dharug language and culture. I think we as a society have enough acknowledgement of the colonial settlers - instead we should be trying to reconnect with the First Nations people and their cultures to better understand and celebrate where we live.

This would acknowledge the traditional custodians of the land.

The Dharug names are nice, and Butchers Lane is nice and short, and self-explanatory (which is always good).

l like the idea of Stamp Lane because of this area of North Parramatta being Brickfield Hill but the connection isn't self-evident and would be lost: no-one is likely to understand that "stamp" refers to bricks.

Would really love to see our indigenous culture represented here!

Great initiative and great name ideas, thank you for letting the local residents be a part of this.

like the reference to the Dharug country.

Not any of the butcher references please, who needs that for a potentially creepy place. Thanks!

("Duba Lane" might be after Frederick Duba, a once local member for Dundas)

l enjoyed reading the history behind the street names which helped me to choose. Stamp Lane is only last because if I hadn't read the meaning (referencing handmake bricks), I would be thinking it related to postage stamps. Brick Lane??
